Laney College, in collaboration with San Mateo County Workforce Investment Board, is offering an Energy Efficiency Sales and Auditing training program focused to transition dislocated workers and returning veterans released after 2003 into positions in the Clean Energy industry.

Energy Efficiency Sales and Auditing

August 30—November 5, 2010

All day classes Monday—Thursday

8:00 am to 5:00 pm

Classes will be held on campus at Laney College.

This program is a 10-week, educational series that includes five courses in energy management, sustainable built environment, measuring building energy efficiency, making the financial case to invest in clean energy, and sales/customer service.

Program eligibility requirements include:

- High school graduate or equivalent
- Workforce Investment Act (WIA) eligible
- 10th grade Math and English placement (Wonderlic) testing
- resident of the State of California for at least one year
- right to work in the United States
- Hold a valid California driver's license and have a clean driving record
- Drug free and must pass background check to secure employment.

Other requirements include excellent oral communications skills, sales experience or aptitude for sales, interest in energy and environmental issues, computer skills, and interest in building systems.

Energy Auditors or Home Energy Raters	\$42,000 - \$70,000
Resource Conservation or Energy Efficiency Managers	\$52,000 - \$83,200
Project Managers for Construction or Design Work	\$60,000 - \$90,000
